Dr. Gregory received a bachelor’s degree in communication disorders with minors in linguistics and black studies from New Paltz State College in New York. She received a master’s degree in speech pathology from the State University at Buffalo and earned a doctorate in communication sciences and disorders from Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge, Louisiana.
