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Salus University Osborne College of Audiology Offers Summer Workshop Series

Elkins Park, PA – Two four-day workshops and one daylong workshop have been scheduled at Salus University this summer. The goal of the summer workshops is to provide an update on a specific topic of study, to review clinical implications and provide hands on training using new tools and techniques. Each workshop will be taught by a Salus faculty member who is distinguished in their field. AAA and ASHA continuing education credits will be offered pending approval. Workshops are open to current audiology practitioners/educators/clinicians. Registration is required and there is a fee to participate.

The *Diagnosis and Management of External and Middle Ear Function* workshop will be take place from July 22 to 25, led by James Hall III, PhD, and Dr. Lisa L Hunter, PhD, FAAA. Dr. Hall is an adjunct professor of audiology at Salus University. He has been published in many medical journals for his work and research in audiology and speech pathology. Dr. Hunter is the scientific director of research, division of audiology at Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center, and is a professor of otolaryngology and communication sciences and disorders at the University of Cincinnati. She has more than 25 years of pediatric clinical, research and teaching, and has authored a variety of published articles, chapters and books.

The second four day workshop, *Technology and Clinical Best Practices for 2017* workshop will take place from July 27 to 30, led by George Lindley, PhD, and Jason Galster, PhD, CCC-A, FAAA. Dr. Lindley is a professor of audiology and interim assistant dean at Salus University. He also currently is an owner of East Penn Hearing Center, where he works as an audiologist. Dr. Galster is a senior manager of audiology research at Starkey Hearing and an adjunct professor at Nova Southeastern University in Florida. He is a renowned researcher and has been published in numerous books.

In addition to the four day workshops, Salus University is also offering a daylong workshop on Cerumen Management on July 25. Participants will learn about the anatomy and physiology of the ear involved with cerumen management, lighting

options, specialty tools, post-procedure problems and more. The workshop will offer .65 tier 1 continuing education credits. Registration is required
