When professor Andrea Tyszka decided to disclose her multiple sclerosis diagnosis, she never imagined the impact it would make on her students.

"I disclosed so they could get to know me personally," Andrea says. "I'm training future occupational therapists to work with people with MS. I wanted them to have a view of patients as people with real strengths and weaknesses."
